Every 4th Grader Should Read



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


**Thirst** by Varsha Bajaj. The inspiring tale of a heroic girl from a poor part of Mumbai fighting for her belief that water should be for everyone.

13-year-old Arturo Zamora do it all or is he in for a BIG, EPIC FAIL?




Give Bees a Chance by

away from them. It's more


important now than ever to get on board with our honey-making friends!




The Last Kids on Earth:

monster apocalypse.





in unexpected places.




Roller Girl by Victoria


Shirley & Jamila Save


